Apprenticeship Programs

Apprenticeship programs combine classroom instruction with hands-on experience, typically culminating in certification, which can enhance a technician's career prospects. 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Continuing Education and Certifications

For those already in the field, pursuing certification as a Certified Dental Technician (CDT) or additional continuing education courses can provide opportunities for career advancement. Specialized training in digital dentistry, CAD/CAM technology, and other areas can also help technicians expand their skills. Commercial Dental Laboratory

Many dental technicians work in commercial dental laboratories, fabricating dental appliances for dental offices. These laboratories provide a dynamic work environment, exposure to a range of cases, and the opportunity to specialize in areas like ceramics, orthodontics, or crown and bridge work. Dental technicians in these laboratories work closely with dental professionals, providing quick turnaround times and custom solutions for patients. Dental School Laboratories

Dental schools often employ dental laboratory technicians to support student training and provide prosthetic services. Dental technicians in dental schools work alongside dental students and faculty, contributing to an academic setting and engaging with future dentists. Additionally, the Commission on Dental Accreditation (CODA) is the national programmatic accrediting agency for dental and dental-related education programs at the post-secondary level. CODA employs a rigorous, collaborative peer review accreditation process to evaluate

Veterans Affairs (VA) Medical Centers

The VA operates specialized dental laboratories to provide care to veterans. Dental technicians employed by the VA work in a structured environment with competitive benefits, focusing on providing quality prosthetic care for veterans. VA laboratories are excellent options for technicians seeking stable, meaningful work.

Dental Technology Research and Development

With advancements in digital dentistry and materials science, some dental technicians move into research roles, working for dental product manufacturers or in academic settings. These technicians contribute to developing new materials, tools, and techniques, helping shape the future of the field.

Dental Supply and CAD/CAM Equipment Companies

Some dental technicians transition to roles within dental product companies, where they may provide technical support, training, and demonstrations for dental laboratories adopting new technologies.
